PARENT'S ORIENTATION

On 5th April 2025, a Parents' Orientation Program was successfully conducted at P.P. Savani Cambridge International School for the parents of students from Grade 1 to 10. FIELD TRIP TO ORCHARD

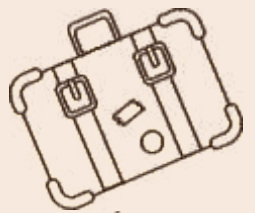

TEACHER TRAINING SESSION: BEST PRACTICES IN CLASSROOMS



A teacher training session on the topic “Best Practices in Classrooms from Pre-Primary to Grade 12” was held on 12th April 2025. The session focused on exploring innovative and effective teaching strategies across academic stages, encouraging educators to reflect, share, and enhance their classroom approach.

To begin, participants engaged in a creative ice-breaker activity titled "I Am Emoji", where each teacher illustrated three emojis that represented them and added an adjective starting with the first letter of their name—for instance, “Motivated Mohini” or “Jovial Jitendra.” This light, expressive exercise helped set a warm, collaborative tone for the session.

The core of the training was an interactive presentation that highlighted a range of adaptable classroom practices. These included, but were not limited to, using role-play and enactment in language classes to deepen comprehension and boost expression, game creation and design challenges in mathematics to foster logical thinking, and setting up interactive science corners for exploratory learning. Ideas like circle time reflections in early years, and art-integrated projects for interdisciplinary learning were also explored. The discussion emphasized tailoring techniques to suit student age groups and subject demands while keeping engagement and understanding at the core.

Following this, teachers were divided into diverse groups—each comprising educators from Pre-Primary, Primary, Secondary, and Higher Secondary levels. Each group shared one impactful classroom practice that had worked particularly well in their context. This segment turned into a rich pool of peer-led learning, as participants exchanged practical ideas that could be adapted across levels.

The session concluded with a reflective summary by the trainer, underscoring the need for continuous dialogue, creativity, and a student-centered mindset in effective teaching. The training was marked by active participation and an encouraging spirit of collaboration among the teaching staff.

AWARD AND GRADUATION CEREMONY

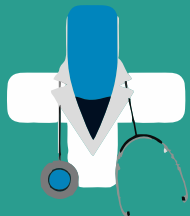

POEM COMPETITION

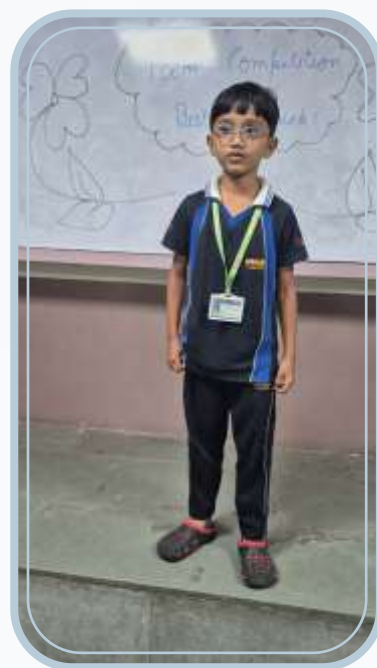

Ancient seers prophesied floods and fires; scriptures spoke of judgment days; modern scientists warn of nuclear winters, ecological collapse, and the cold indifference of an expanding universe. Civilizations have risen and perished, yet the question endures, echoing like a death knell through the corridors of history: how shall it all end?

This fascination with annihilation is no mere curiosity. It is the very marrow of our condition as conscious

beings. Unlike the sparrow or the stone, we are burdened with the knowledge of finitude. We know, in the marrow of our bones, that we shall die. To imagine the death of the world, therefore, is to project our personal dread onto the cosmic canvas. Apocalypse is an autobiography disguised as prophecy. Every end we conjure is a mirror, reflecting not the fate of the planet, but the fragility of our own breath.

Yet there is also something intoxicating about catastrophe. Endings give structure to chaos. A universe that drifts endlessly is terrifying, but a universe that concludes — whether in rapture or ruin — at least means something. But herein lies the paradox: in our obsession with extinction, we forget existence. We squander the present in preparing for a future that may never arrive. We hoard weapons against shadows, build bunkers against specters, yet rarely build meaning against despair. We narrate our demise so often that we cease to narrate our lives. Like moths circling a flame, we are hypnotized by the thought of destruction, blind to the quiet miracle of survival.

Perhaps the true apocalypse is not the fire that consumes, but the emptiness within that corrodes. The death of imagination, the erosion of empathy, the surrender to nihilism — these are doomsdays more insidious than meteors or plagues. For the world does not end only when oceans rise or stars collapse; it ends every time humanity abdicates its duty to wonder, to create, to care.

And so, our obsession with The End is less about prophecy than confession. It reveals our terror of insignificance, our longing for closure, our hunger for meaning in a universe that speaks in silences. Maybe the question is not when the world will end, but whether we will have truly lived before it does. For perhaps the greatest tragedy is not the final chapter, but the unwritten pages we leave untouched.
